Bloom Spotlight



Supertunia Vista Bubblegum, AgCenter

Plant Name: Supertunia Vista Bubblegum (*Petunia x hybrida*)

Recommended Use: Cool-season bedding plant, containers, and hanging baskets

Exposure: Part to full sun

Size: Height: 12" to 24", Width: 24" to 36"

Growth Habit: Vigorous, mounding and trailing

Bloom Time: Fall through late spring (Sept–May, until heat sets in)

Highlights: Bright bubblegum-pink blooms, vigorous growth, self-cleaning, heat- and drought-tolerant, and attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.

Garden Gems

Fall & Winter Elegance: Camellias and Sasanquas Bring Classic Beauty to Your Garden

When the garden begins to fade in the cooler months, Camellias and their close relatives, Sasanquas, step into the spotlight. These Southern favorites are prized for their glossy evergreen leaves and breathtaking blooms, adding elegance and color to Louisiana landscapes from fall through early spring. With timeless charm and dependable performance, Camellias and Sasanquas are must-have plants for gardeners seeking year-round interest.

Camellias (*Camellia japonica*) are best known for their large, showy flowers in shades of pink, red, and white, often blooming from January through March. Their blooms can be formal, semi-double, or peony-like, with many cultivars offering exquisite variations. Sasanquas (*Camellia sasanqua*), by contrast, begin flowering earlier—typically from October through December—covering themselves in masses of smaller, delicate blooms. Together, these two plants ensure months of continuous garden color.

Beyond their flowers, Camellias and Sasanquas add year-round beauty with their dark, glossy foliage and tidy growth habits. Camellias typically grow upright and can reach 6 to 12 feet tall, making them excellent as foundation plantings, specimen shrubs, or even small trees with pruning. Sasanquas are often more compact, with a graceful, airy form ideal for hedges, screens, or mass plantings. Popular cultivars like *Camellia japonica* 'Debutante' with soft pink double flowers, or *Camellia sasanqua* 'Shishi Gashira' with rosy pink blooms on a compact, spreading shrub, showcase just how versatile these plants can be. These Southern staples prefer partial shade with protection from hot afternoon sun, thriving in acidic, well-drained soil. Mulching with pine bark or pine straw helps retain moisture and keeps roots cool while preventing weeds. Regular watering during dry spells, particularly in the first few years after planting, encourages strong root development. A balanced, slow-release fertilizer in spring supports healthy growth and abundant blooms. Planting Camellias and Sasanquas requires a little patience but is straightforward. Dig a wide, shallow hole and set the plant so the top of the root ball sits slightly above ground level to prevent rot. Space plants according to their mature size, giving them room to spread gracefully over time. Once established, they are relatively low-maintenance, rewarding gardeners with reliable beauty year after year.

While hardy and long-lived, Camellias and Sasanquas can face occasional challenges. Tea scale, a common pest, causes yellowing leaves; treating with horticultural oil in late winter or early spring helps manage infestations. Root rot may develop in poorly drained soils, making site selection critical. Removing spent blooms also helps prevent petal blight, a fungal disease that browns and spots flowers. With attentive care, most problems can be minimized, allowing the plants to thrive.

With hundreds of cultivars and hybrids available, there's a Camellia or Sasanqua for every garden style—

whether you want a dazzling focal point, a fragrant hedge, or a container-grown treasure. Their ability to brighten landscapes during the quietest months of the year makes them one of the South's most beloved plants. Add grace and year-round interest to your landscape with Camellias and Sasanquas—classic, resilient, and endlessly rewarding plants that bring fall and winter gardens to life.

Get Ahead This Fall with a Soil Test

As we move from the heat of late summer into the cooler days of fall, now is an excellent time to think about testing your soil—whether for your lawn, garden, or pasture. A fall soil test can help you avoid the spring rush, identify what your soil truly needs, and set you up for healthier growth in the coming season.

One of the most common recommendations from a soil test is lime, which is used to raise soil pH. Because lime takes several months to fully break down and adjust soil acidity, applying it in the fall gives your soil plenty of time to be ready for spring growth.

A late-season soil test also provides insight into how your soil performed over the past year. Ideally, results should fall within a mid-range. That means your plants had enough nutrients without too much leftover. High nutrient levels can cause problems down the road, including excessive growth or even groundwater pollution. On the other hand, low values in the fall suggest your plants may have run out of fertility too soon, leaving them stressed and less productive.

If your soil is fairly uniform across your property, one composite sample taken from the top 4–6 inches is

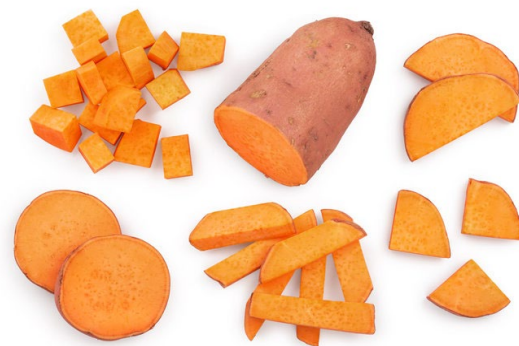
usually enough. Be sure to list all the crops you want recommendations for, whether they are grasses, ornamentals, or vegetables. You can request fertilizer guidance for more than one crop on the same sample. Soil sample bags are available at any LSU AgCenter Extension office, or you can contact your local Parish ANR Agent for assistance. Not sure who your local agent is? 1 medium to large sweet potato
1/4 teaspoon turmeric
1/4 teaspoon cumin
1/4 teaspoon black pepper

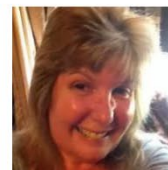

Due to a generous donation of haybales, the Red River Research Station is hosting its second Haybale Decorating Contest, to allow youth and adults an opportunity to showcase their creativity and support of the Homesteader's Conference.

The THEME of the contest is "Falling for Agriculture"

- All paint must be provided by the participant or participating group.
- Groups may utilize any items, as long as they are waterproof, i.e. lumber, wire, cardboard, etc.
- NO balloons!
- There are no electrical outlets. Solar only items may be utilized.
- Haybale dimensions are 4 feet x 5 feet.

The painting dates are one week prior to the Homesteader's Conference which is scheduled for October 17-18, 2025. **All Haybales must be painted/decorated by October 15th!!!**

There will be two categories to enter:

1. **Youth or youth groups**.....any person or persons under the age of 18 or those who have not passed their high school graduation date. This could be any solo youth, or youth group such as: 4-H club, FFA chapter, BETA club, Student Council, art classes, etc.
 - a. There is NO charge for youth entries.
2. **Adult or adult groups**....any person or persons over the age of 18 and who have graduated from high school. This could be any adult group such as: Lions Clubs, Rotary Clubs, the Red Hat Society, Farm Bureau, Police Jurys, professional organizations, and/or businesses, etc.
 - a. We ask that all adults and/or adult groups make a donation to the Red River Research Station to compete in the competition.

All youth and adult entries will be judged by the "Haybale Committee" and the top three haybales, will win a first, second, or third place rosette as well as be featured on the Northwest Region Facebook page. The 1st place winning haybales will also receive an additional prize. This prize is at the discretion of the "Haybale Committee".
